Denis Le Moullac, Cathedral, Paris

Denis was born near Paris on July 28, 1947. He is a graduate of the Institut d'études politiques de Paris (Sciences Po) and hold a Bachelor's degree in law. He had a 38-year career in commercial banking. He retired in 2009.

Denis is married to Bénédicte Vincent. He is the father of Rose (28), Amélie (1989-2013) and Charles (24). Bénédicte has twin sons, aged 27.

A parishioner of the Cathedral since 1977, Denis has sung in the choir for more than 25 years, and served on the Vestry in 1986 and in 2004. He was previously the Convocation's Assistant Treasurer and Acting Treasurer, before being elected Treasurer in 2015.

Professionally, she has been a senior editor at Bloomberg News in Paris for the past 17 years and before that was a correspondent and reporter for The Washington Post.

George Battrick, Ascension, Munich

George Battrick grew up in Manchester in an "ecumenical family" (mother Methodist, father Church of England) and has an MA in engineering from the University of Cambridge. He has lived in Munich, and been a member of the Church of the Ascension, since 1993, having originally planned to stay for only two or three years. He sings in the church choir, has participated in several church "mission and service" trips to "Children in Distress" in Romania, and represents The Episcopal Church in the Bavarian Council of Churches ("AcK in Bayern"). He has completed the first three years of the EfM programme.

He has served several terms on the Church of the Ascension Vestry, including periods as Secretary, Junior Warden and Senior Warden, and has attended Convocation Conventions in all parishes of the Convocation except Clermont Ferrand. He was a member of the Council of Advice for four years, including two years as its President.

He believes that the Anglican "middle way" has a significant role to play in Europe and beyond in a world that seems increasingly factional and polarised, and that while the extremes of Christianity seem to be trying to ignore or roll back the Enlightenment, The Episcopal Church is seriously endeavouring to develop and live Christianity in a post-Enlightenment world.

Council of Advice, Clergy Rev. Deacon Richard Cole, Emmanuel, Geneva

A life-long Episcopalian, Richard Cole has been a member of Emmanuel since arriving in Geneva in 1978. He has been involved in the Parish include Mission and Outreach, Adult Education and head of the Stewardship campaign. He served on the Vestry from 1995 to 2001, and on the Rector Search Committees in 2000 and 2005. He attended his first Convocation Convention as delegate in 1995 and was first elected as Secretary of Convention in 2001, in which capacity he also attends Council of Advice meetings. He served as a layman on COMB from 1999 to 2004 and was reappointed as clergy in 2010. He has been a deputy to the General Convention of the Episcopal Church since 2000, serving on the Stewardship and Dispatch of Business Committees.

Richard studied at the University of Geneva's Faculty of Theology from 2005 to 2008, and was ordained to the Sacred Order of Deacons by Bishop Whalon in January 2009. Since his ordination, he has been involved in Inreach (pastoral care) at Emmanuel and has helped facilitate and train intercessors, lectors, acolytes, Communion servers and Altar Guild members.

Richard would bring to Council not only the unique voice of his diaconal ministry, but also his many years of experience of attending meetings as an ex officio member.



Council of Advice, Clergy Rev. Christopher Easthill, St. Augustine's, Wiesbaden

Since March 2014 I have been Rector, initially Priest-in-charge of the Church of St. Augustine of Canterbury, Wiesbaden. Before becoming a priest, I worked for a German insurance company for 25 years and during most of that time served at Ascension, Munich in various lay leadership functions. I have a BA in German and Management Studies from Leeds University, a foundation degree in Theology and Ministry from St. John's College, Nottingham, and a Master of Divinity from Virginia Theological Seminary.

Before going to seminary, I was lay co-chair of the Council of Anglican Episcopal Churches in Germany (CAECG) for two terms (8 years). In March 2016, I was elected a member of the governing board (Vorstand) of the German Ecumenical Council of Churches (ACK Arbeitsgemeinschaft Christlicher Kirchen in Deutschland). Following last year's Convention, I was appointed to the Convocation's Commission on Mission Congregations (COMC). I believe that both my management and ecumenical experience would be of benefit to the Council of Advice, which is why I am standing for one of the two yacant clergy positions.



Council of Advice, Clergy Rev. Dorothee Hahn, Episcopal Church Missionary to Romania

Received into the Episcopal Church in 1999, Rev. Dorothee was working as a lawyer in the Munich area and member of the Commission on the Ministry of the Baptized (COMB) when she followed her call to the priesthood. After studies at the university in Munich, Germany and Virginia Theological Seminary, Alexandria, VA, USA she was ordained deacon and later priest in 2005. Five years she served as first curate, then assistant rector at the Church of the

Ascension in Munich, mainly being in charge of the mission congregations in Augsburg and Nuremberg.

In 2012 she began serving as Missionary of the Episcopal Church in Romania where she serves among the poor in cooperation with the local Orthodox Church. She continues to be a member of COMB and is co-organizer of the annual Spirituality Retreat.
